We have several students that are fearful of dogs and do not feel safe when they are in proximity to them, so even the sight of a dog on property can be traumatic.

Having a dog as part of our family, I understand the want to include them in morning routines and as part of the process in dropping off children to school. If dogs are brought on the walk to school, please make certain to have them stop before entering school property. At the front of the school (south side), please do not pass the front sidewalk. On the primary entrance (west side), please keep behind the fence entry. On the east side, please keep them at or behind the path, and on the north side (back field), please keep them behind the large trees.
